The Sunday Of The Passion: Palm Sunday

On this day almost 2,000 years ago, our Lord entered the holy city of Jerusalem. It seemed to be His moment of triumph as the people welcomed Him in the way they welcomed their kings on great occasions, with shouts of praise and palm branches thrown in His path. But by the following Friday, the crowd's "hosannas" had changed to "Crucify him!" and Jesus was being raised onto a cross. The Palm Sunday Mass highlights this shift from triumph to agony. The Mass begins remembering Jesus' "triumphant" entry into Jerusalem with the Liturgy of the Palms. This mini-liturgy will begin on our back lawn. There, the palms will be blessed and distributed to the congregation. We will then sing the traditional hymn, All Glory, Laud, and Honor and go all together in procession into the Church just as the people would have done that day in Jerusalem.

Beginning with the readings from Holy Scripture, the mood of the Liturgy changes dramatically. The focus shifts from Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to His passion on the cross. The reading of the Passion Gospel reminds us that we are all part of this great drama of redemption. The truth of this day is that, by our sins, we all are responsible for the passion and death of our Lord. The glory of this day is that we know the Resurrection is coming, bringing with it the promise of everlasting life "with Him who suffered and died for us, and rose again." Truth and Glory - these are Palm Sunday's gifts to the worshiper. Holy Week begins.

Angelus (Stand)

The Liturgy Of The Palms

Celebrant: Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel.

People: Blessed is he who comes in the Name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Celebrant: Dear brothers and sisters, from the beginning of Lent until now we have been preparing our hearts by repentance and self-sacrifice. Today, with the whole Church, we herald the beginning of the celebration of the Paschal Mystery. On this day our Lord Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem and was welcomed as King with palms and shouts of praise. Today we greet him as our King, though we know his crown was a crown of thorns, and his throne a Cross.

Therefore, I invite you to follow our Lord this Holy Week, from his triumphal entry, through his suffering and death, to the glory of his resurrection.

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. **People:** And with your spirit.

Celebrant: Let us pray. Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Holy Gospel Mark 11:1-11

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Mark.

People: Glory to you Lord Christ

Now when they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately.'" And they went away and found a colt tied at a door outside in the street, and they untied it. And some of those standing there said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" And they told them what Jesus had said, and they let them go.

And they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it, and he sat on it. And many spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut from the fields. And those who went before and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the highest!" And he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple. And when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

Deacon: The Gospel of the Lord. **People:** Praise to you Lord Christ.

Celebrant: We praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was hailed as King by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Sanctify these branches with your blessing, we humbly pray, that they may be for us signs of his victory. Grant that we who bear them in his Name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

After the blessing of the Palms, the priests and lay readers will distribute the Palms.

People: Blessed is he who comes in the Name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Deacon: Let us go forth in peace.

People: In the Name of Christ. Amen.


Then the congregation follows in procession to the Church and sings Hymn 154 (repeat verses until all are in the Church)



After all have arrived in the Church, the following collect is said:

Celebrant: Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the Cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The congregation remains standing and continues with the singing of Hymn 156.



The Liturgy Of The Word

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. **People:** And with your spirit.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

Collect for Palm Sunday

Almighty and everlasting God, in your tender love for us you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon himself our nature, and to suffer death upon the Cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and come to share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Children's Chapel Procession

All children ages 4-8 are invited to follow the cross to a service just for them.

They will rejoin us in the Church after the Peace.

First Reading (Sit)

Isaiah 52:13-53:12

Behold, my servant shall act wisely; he shall be high and lifted up, and shall be exalted. As many were astonished at you— his appearance was so marred, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of the children of mankind—so shall he sprinkle many nations. Kings shall shut their mouths because of him, for that which has not been told them they see, and that which they have not heard they understand. Who has believed what he has heard from us? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? For he grew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one—to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth. By oppression and judgment he was taken away; and as for his generation, who considered that he was cut off out of the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people? And they made his grave with the wicked and with a rich man in his death, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth. Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him; he has put him to grief; when his soul makes an offering for guilt, he shall see his offspring; he shall prolong his days; the will of the Lord shall prosper in his hand. Out of the anguish of his soul he shall see and be satisfied; by his knowledge shall the righteous one, my servant, make many to be accounted righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore I will divide him a portion with the many, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he poured out his soul to death and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and makes intercession for the transgressors.

Reader: The word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.



Psalm 22:1-11

- 1 My God, my God, why have you for- / saken me? * and are so far from my cry and from the / words of my distress?
- O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you / do not answer; * by night as well, / but I find no rest.
- 3 Yet you are the / Holy One, * enthroned upon the / **praises** of Israel.
- 4 Our forefathers put their / trust in you; * they trusted, and / you delivered them.
- 5 They cried out to you and / were delivered; * they trusted in you and / were not put to shame.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm / and no man, * scorned by all and de- / spised by the people.

Second Reading

Philippians 2:5-11

Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and

under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Reader: The word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.

Sequence (Stand) Hymn 474

The Passion Gospel

Mark 14:32-15:47

The congregation reads the part of the "Crowd."

Narrator: The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Mark.

The congregation may be seated.

Narrator: They went to a place called Gethsem'ane; and Jesus said to his

disciples,

Jesus: "Sit here, while I pray."

Narrator: He took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be

distressed and agitated. And said to them,

Jesus: "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake."

Narrator: And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed

that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. He said,

Jesus: "Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from

me; yet, not what I want, but what you want."

Narrator: He came and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter,

Jesus: "Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? Keep

awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the

spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Narrator: And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. And

once more he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were

very heavy; and they did not know what to say to him. He came a third time and said to them,

Jesus: "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Enough! The hour has

come; the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up,

let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."

Narrator: Immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve,

arrived; and with him there was a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. Now the betrayer had

given them a sign, saying,

Judas: "The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under

guard."

Narrator: So when he came, he went up to him at once and said,

Judas: "Rabbi!"

Narrator: and kissed him. Then they laid hands on him and arrested him. But

one of those who stood near drew his sword and struck the slave of

the high priest, cutting off his ear. Then Jesus said to them,

Jesus: "Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I

were a bandit? Day after day I was with you in the temple teaching,

and you did not arrest me. But let the scriptures be fulfilled."

Narrator: All of them deserted him and fled. A certain young man was following him, wearing nothing but a linen cloth. They caught hold of

him, but he left the linen cloth and ran off naked. They took Jesus to the high priest; and all the chief priests, the elders, and the scribes were assembled. Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the

courtyard of the high priest; and he was sitting with the guards, warming himself at the fire. Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for testimony against Jesus to put him to

death; but they found none. For many gave false testimony against him, and their testimony did not agree. Some stood up and gave

false testimony against him, saying,

Palm Sunday	
Accusers:	"We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and in three days I will build another, not made with hands.'"
Narrator:	But even on this point their testimony did not agree. Then the high priest stood up before them and asked Jesus,
High Priest:	"Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?"
Narrator:	But he was silent and did not answer. Again the high priest asked him,
High Priest:	"Are you the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One?"
Narrator:	Jesus said,
Jesus:	"I am; and 'you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power,' and 'coming with the clouds of heaven.'"
Narrator:	Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,
High Priest:	"Why do we still need witnesses? You have heard his blasphemy! What is your decision?"
Narrator:	All of them condemned him as deserving death. Some began to spit on him, to blindfold him, and to strike him, saying to him,
Accusers:	"Prophesy!"
Narrator:	The guards also took him over and beat him. While Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said,
Servant-Girl:	"You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth."
Narrator:	But he denied it, saying,
Peter:	"I do not know or understand what you are talking about."

Narrator: And he went out into the forecourt. Then the cock crowed. And the

servant-girl, on seeing him, began again to say to the bystanders,

Servant-Girl: "This man is one of them."

Narrator: But again he denied it. Then after a little while the bystanders again

said to Peter,

Bystanders: "Certainly you are one of them; for you are a Galilean."

Narrator: But he began to curse, and he swore an oath,

Peter: "I do not know this man you are talking about."

Narrator: At that moment the cock crowed for the second time. Then Peter

remembered that Jesus had said to him,

Jesus: "Before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times."

Narrator: And he broke down and wept. As soon as it was morning, the chief

priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to

Pilate. Pilate asked him,

Pilate: "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Narrator: He answered him.

Jesus: "You say so."

Narrator: Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him

again,

Pilate: "Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against

you."

Narrator: But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed. Now at

the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels

who had committed murder during the insurrection. So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. Then he answered them.

Pilate: "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?"

Narrator: For he realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had

handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again.

Pilate: "Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of

the Jews?"

Narrator: They shouted back,

Crowd: "Crucify him!"

Narrator: Pilate asked them,

Pilate: "Why, what evil has he done?"

Narrator: But they shouted all the more,

Crowd: "Crucify him!"

Narrator: So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them;

and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified. Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began

saluting him,

Soldiers: "Hail, King of the Jews!"

Narrator: They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in

homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him. They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the

country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus.

The congregation will please stand.

Narrator: Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means

the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him and divided his clothes

among them, casting lots to decide what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with

him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

Bystanders: "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days,

save yourself, and come down from the cross!"

Narrator: In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also

mocking him among themselves and saying,

Chief Priests: "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King

of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and

believe."

Narrator: Those who were crucified with him also taunted him. When it was

noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the

afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice.

Jesus: "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

Narrator: which means,

Jesus: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Narrator: When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,

Bystanders: "Listen, he is calling for Elijah."

Narrator: And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick,

and gave it to him to drink, saying,

Bystanders: "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down."

Narrator: Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

All kneel in silent prayer. After praying, please stand.

Narrator: And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom.

Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way

he breathed his last, he said,

Centurion: "Truly this man was God's Son!"

Narrator: There were also women looking on from a distance; among them

were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem. When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where the body was laid.

Let our hearts suffer in thy Passion, Lord, that very suffering may thy mercy win.


This is the night of tears, the three days' space, sorrow abiding of the eventide,

People: We lift them up to the Lord.


Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. **People:** It is right to give him thanks and praise.

All praise and glory is yours, O God our heavenly Father, for in your tender mercy, you gave your only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption. He made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and he instituted, and in his Holy Gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

So now, O merciful Father, in your great goodness, we ask you to bless and sanctify, with your Word and Holy Spirit, these gifts of bread and wine, that we, receiving them according to your Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

For on the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

Therefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of your dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we your humble servants celebrate and make here before your divine Majesty, with these holy gifts, the memorial your Son commanded us to make; remembering his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and his promise to come again.

And we earnestly desire your fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this, our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; asking you to grant that, by the merits and death of your Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his Blood, we and your whole Church may obtain forgiveness of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present to you, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice. We humbly pray that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ, be filled with your grace and heavenly benediction, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, because of our many sins, to offer you any sacrifice, yet we ask you to accept this duty and service we owe, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. Amen.

Celebrant: And now as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray:

Celebrant and People: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread 2019 Book of Common Prayer, pg. 118


